 Re: Child Nutrition Programs, Meal Charge Policy, and Dietary Accommodations

USDA Child Nutrition Programs School Year 2025-2026

DC Public Schools (DCPS) is proud to offer nutritious meals to support student learning and success. DCPS participates in the National School Lunch Program and adheres to guidelines established by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the DC Healthy Schools Act. The Division of Food and Nutrition Services (FNS) operates the National School Breakfast Program, the National School Lunch Program, the Child and Adult Care Food Program, the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program, and the Summer Food Service Program.

DCPS FNS will charge for meals at non-Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) schools during school year 2025-2026. Breakfast remains at no cost to students at all DCPS schools, and after-school meals (provided at select schools) are universally free. Contact your school administrator to learn about meal programs specific to your school.

What is a Meal? (Grades K-12)	
Breakfast	Lunch
Breakfast includes a combination of the following components: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Whole grains and/or a meat or meat alternate Fruit and/or vegetable Low-fat, Skim, or Lactose Free milk To qualify as a reimbursable meal, students must select at least three (3) components , and one must be a fruit or vegetable .	Lunch includes: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Whole grains Fruits (may select >1 serving) Vegetables (may select >1 serving) Meat or meat alternate Low-fat, Skim, or Lactose Free milk Students must choose at least three (3) components , with one being a fruit or vegetable , to meet USDA meal pattern requirements.

Free and Reduced-Price Meals (FARM) Application and Family Economic Survey Form

Your student may qualify for free lunch in one of the following ways:

- If your student attends one of the 97 schools participating in the Community Eligibility Provision Program (CEP); to see this list of schools, please see Appendix B of this document, visit the web page below, or contact your

school. <https://dcps.dc.gov/page/community-eligibility-provision-cep-schools>.

- b. At non-CEP schools, DCPS students may qualify for free meals by:
 - a. Direct Certification:
 - i. Students are in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF).
 - ii. Students are foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or the court, or are homeless, migrant, categorically eligible, or runaway.
 - b. A [Free and Reduced-Priced Meal \(FARM\) application](#) is submitted and approved based on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines. See Appendix A for a list of DC Public Schools that require a FARM application.

If your child does not attend a CEP school and is not directly certified, please complete the 2025 - 2026 Free and Reduced-Price Meal (FARM) application online at dcps.dc.gov/FARM to see if they are eligible for free lunch.

NOTE: A new form must be completed each school year. The form for the following school year becomes available July 1st of each year. Automated communications are used to remind families to complete FARM applications to ensure all students who qualify for free meals are made aware of the application. All school-aged children in income-eligible households can receive school meal benefits regardless of immigration status. The Public Charge rule does not apply to FARM benefits.

Previous FARM Status Students

The 30-school day grace period for completing the FARM application for students who qualified for FARM or attended a CEP school last year ends on:

1. Grades K-12: October 6, 2025
2. Grades PK3-PK4: October 9, 2025

New FARM Applicants *(New to DCPS or no prior SY24-25 FARM application on file)*

New applicants, attending non-CEP schools, are strongly encouraged to have their applications submitted before August 25th, 2025, to take advantage of their meal benefits. More information about these benefits can be found at <https://dcps.dc.gov/farm>.

Meal Payments

The balance of student meal accounts that have carried over from the 2024-2025 school year will be sent in a separate letter.

Submit payment for lunch meals in one of the following ways:

1. By loading funds with a credit/debit card on your student's online meal account (including relevant processing fee per transaction) or,
2. By sending a check or money order (**student ID# must be included**) made payable to the **DC Treasurer** to the following address:

Students will never be refused their initial lunch meal or served an alternate meal selection if there are no funds in the student's account. The meal will automatically be charged to the student's account and will create a negative meal balance. Students with a negative meal balance are not identified in any way during meal service and will receive the same meal choices.

Negative Meal Balance

As a courtesy reminder, if a student's meal account goes into debt, households will get a weekly automatic email. Automated communications will continue until the negative meal balance is paid. The above payment methods (online and check/money order) can be used to pay off negative meal balances.

As your student continues to eat lunch and no payment is made, negative meal balances will increase. Any unpaid meal balances will roll over into the next school year. Any payments made will first go to pay off the negative meal balance. DCPS Food and Nutrition Services makes every effort to answer questions related to negative meal balances and repayment.

Dietary Accommodation Forms

If your student needs a special diet or meal plan at school because of a food allergy, medical condition, or religious or personal belief, please let us know. Please complete a dietary accommodation form at dcps.dc.gov/page/dietary-accommodations and submit the completed form to dietary.forms@k12.dc.gov or to your school's cafeteria manager. Please allow time for the processing and development of menus. A new form must be submitted if any changes to your child's diet occur but otherwise no longer needs to be submitted each school year. FNS reserves the right to decline a request that is beyond reasonable accommodation.
